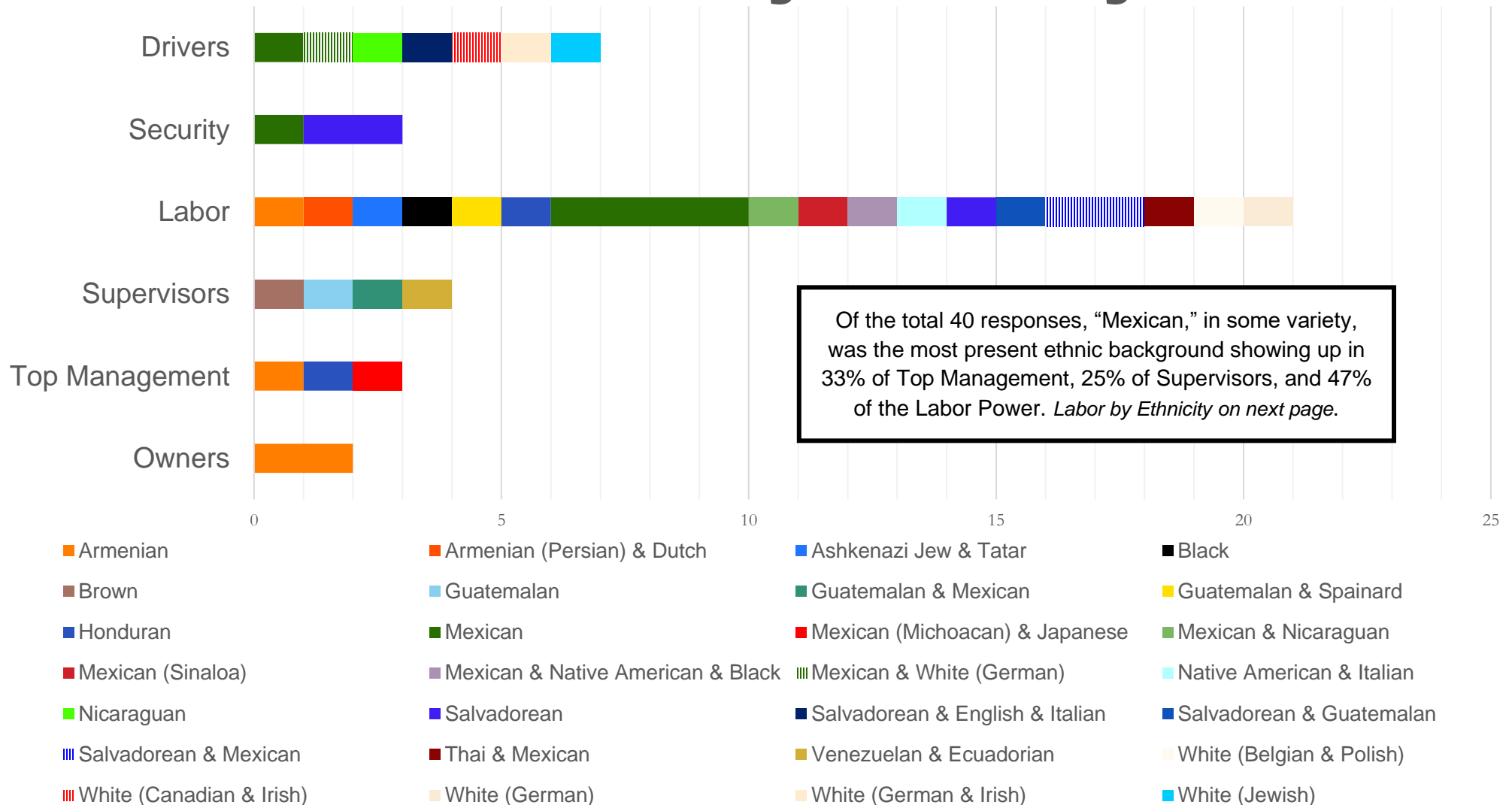


LA Dispensary Workplace Diversity (June 2020)

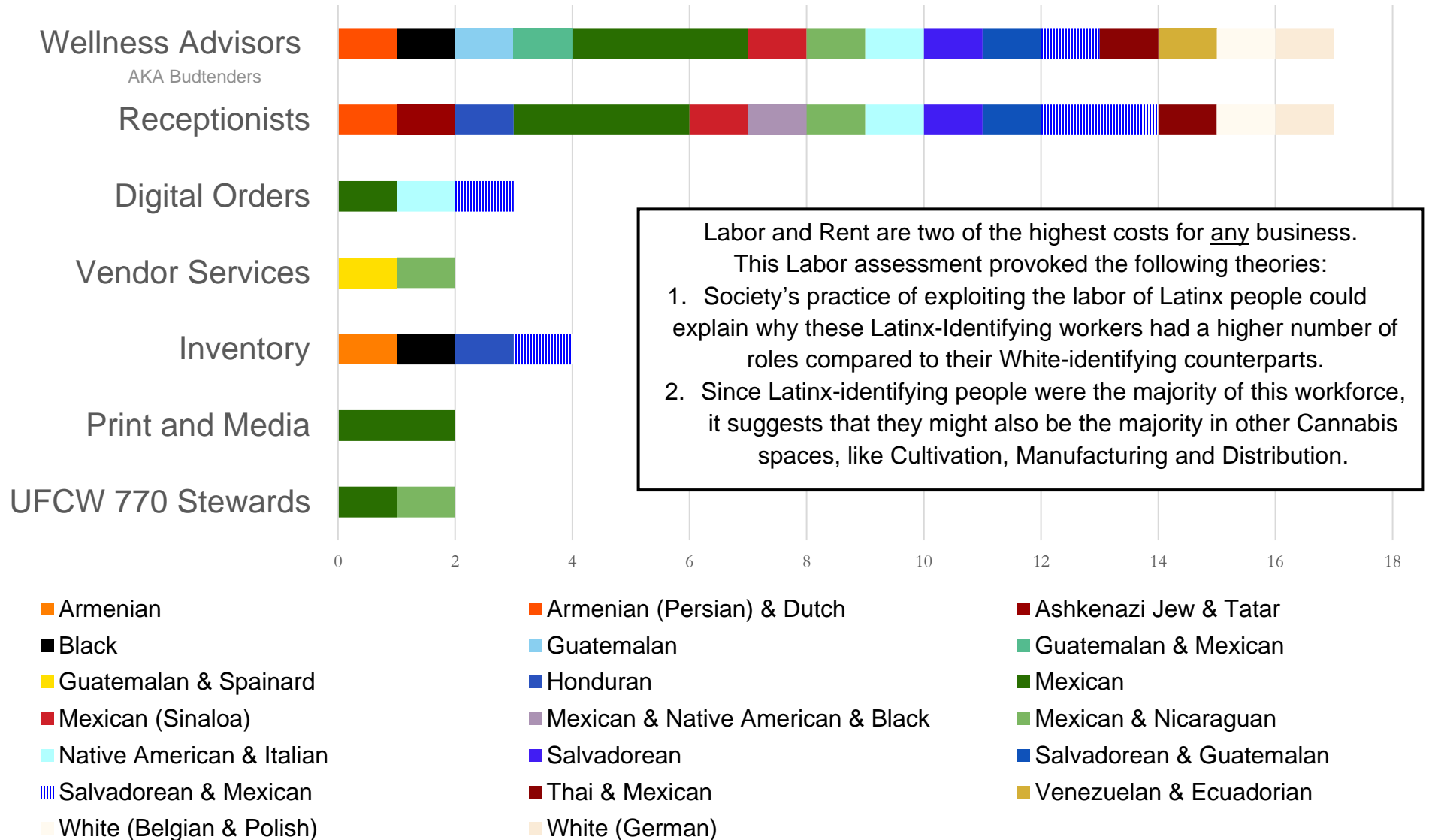
All Staff by Ethnicity

The timeframe for this employee count and role assessment was: 6/12/2020 – 6/18-2020

The information acquired for this project was done via in-person conversations and some one-on-one digital messages. Ethnicity was the specific response sought after - Citizenship/Nationality was NOT in question here, **Cultural Background** was.

Method of Approach:

I found that asking about Ethnicity was least difficult after I'd disclose mine first.

Example talking piece: ***I identify as “Mexican”** because both of my parents immigrated here from Mexico where **they** were born - Mexican culture was what I learned from my upbringing. I am a first-generation American. Both countries have contributed to **my** sense of culture, so I would fully describe myself as “Mexican-American”; specifically I would still say my ethnicity is Mexican – What would you say your ethnicity is?*

Ethnicity refers to one's self or familial national origin & shared cultural traditions.

For the purposes of honoring those origins and traditions, I dove deeper when people would respond with: “Hispanic”, “Latina/o”, “Asian” or “Caucasian” – these nouns are not specific. The point of this project is to showcase diversity. By giving the workers the space to self-identify, their various cultures could be seen without being placed in one ambiguous, at times monolithic, category.
